THE SPONSORS:

ANOTHER CHICAGO MAGAZINE (ACM) has lived among the crumbs of consistency for the past 30 years. ACM has remained an independent, self-reliant literary journal for the duration of that time, publishing work by a wide range of established writers (including the likes of Brigit Pegeen Kelly, David Sedaris, and Robin Hemley), and relative newcomers (Ada Limon, Dobby Gibson, and Emily Rosko among them), as well as interviews with literary stalwarts (Amiri Baraka, Dagoberto Gilb, and Kathy Acker, to name-check a few). ACM's current issue, "ACM is Dead" features work by Michael Czyzniejewski, John Beer, Joshua Marie Wilkinson, and Richard Wirick. ACM's forthcoming issue, "American Values," will be available in Spring '08.

CANARIUM 1 (featuring work by Ed Roberson, Arda Collins, Takashi Hiraide, Srikanth Reddy, and a dozen other poets) is the first venture from **Canarium Books**, a poetry press sponsored by the University of Michigan. The first single-author books from the press will appear in 2009. Canarium's predecessor, *The Canary*, is on a brief hiatus during the development of Canarium Books. THE DANNY'S READING SERIES occurs one Wednesday per month, featuring poets and writers from around the country and abroad, at Danny's Tavern in Chicago. The series is curated by Joel Craig and Chris Glomski.

The current issue, "City in Biography," features short stories by John McNally, an interview with Bruce Olds, and a poetry section edited by Ed Roberson with poems from Reginald Gibbons, Carolyn M.
